Increase HPV vaccination rates and decrease HPVrelated cancers through evidence-based interventions in Pennsylvania.


Structure

HPV-related Cancers is one of the workgroups of the Pennsylvania Cancer Coalition (PCC).

Goal

Increase HPV vaccination* rates in adolescents (13 years-old to 17 years-old) by 20% through December 2023.

*HPV vaccination is the two-shot dose.



Membership

The workgroup comprises organizations and individuals committed to using evidence-based interventions for prevention, screening and early detection. One of the prevention strategies is to ensure that all young people in Pennsylvania are fully immunized and protected against HPV-related cancers.

Benefits of membership
