## July is Sarcoma Awareness Month

Sarcomas are cancers that develop from bones or soft tissues, such as fat, muscles, nerves, and more. Because bone and soft tissues can be found nearly everywhere in the body, a sarcoma can start in any part of the body.

- 60% begin in an arm or leg
- 30% start in the torso or abdomen
- 10% occur in the head or neck

Both children and adults can develop a sarcoma. It is rare, accounting for about 1% of all adult cancers. However, sarcomas represent about 15% of all childhood cancers.

Sarcomas are divided into two main groups: bone sarcomas and soft tissue sarcomas. They are further subclassified based on the type of presumed cell of origin found in the tumor. They all share certain microscopic characteristics and have similar symptoms. Although rare, there are approximately 17,000 new cases of sarcoma diagnosed each year in the United States. Because sarcomas are rare, it is important to find

#### **GET A CLOSER LOOK AT U.S. CANCER DATA**



The latest <u>U.S. Cancer Statistics</u> show that new cancer cases diagnosed in 2021 were higher than in 2020, but were slightly lower than pre-pandemic levels, especially among adults 40 years or older and men. This may have been due to continued gaps in cancer screening and diagnosis caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

<u>U.S. Cancer Statistics</u> are the official federal cancer statistics, providing cancer information on the U.S. population. Statistics on cancer incidence combine cancer registry data from <u>CDC's National Program of Cancer Registries (NPCR)</u> and the National Cancer Institute's <u>Surveillance. Epidemiology, and End Results (SEER)</u> Program and include important clinical, demographic, and outcome data.

The latest data include information about new cancer cases diagnosed through 2021, the first year after the COVID-19 pandemic began. The data release also includes cancer deaths through 2022. From 2020 to 2021, the rate of new cancer cases:

- Increased most for cancers commonly diagnosed during preventive or routine health visits such as breast, prostate, colon and rectum, melanoma, and thyroid cancer.
- · Increased more among women than among men.
- Increased more among non-Hispanic Asian and Pacific Islander people than among people of other racial and ethnic groups.

CDC will continue to monitor data to understand the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic on cancer incidence and mortality. The latest cancer data can be used to create and evaluate prevention programs, conduct research, and take actions to reduce health disparities to improve cancer outcomes for all. CDC will continue to encourage people to get back into routine screening. Read the USCS Data brief for highlights from the 2021 data.
